




Green Councillor, Gregory Smith

Oxford to Cambridge Arc hasn't gone away

Although the government have shelved the expressway idea, the idea of 1 million new homes by 2040 within the arc has not been dropped. Stop the Arc action group recently did their own consultation and found that over 90% of local people oppose the **Arc concept**. Contrary to popular belief, building more houses does not result in more affordable house prices. there is no need for significantly more jobs here, as there is negligible unemployment and water supplies are not sufficient for such an increase in population. The National Farmers' Union say that 300,000 hectares of good farmland would be lost to development. In addition the group have shown that Oxford, Cambridge and the towns in between have no common industries which would make a joined-up approach useful, unlike some of the Midlands and the north of England.

Noise affects residents' quality of life

Gregory Smith at Haddenham business park

Residents of Dollicott, Haddenham have been complaining of excessive noise from a company on the business park. A resident said that being woken in the middle of the night and again in the early hours of the morning was a real problem. Complaints to Environmental Health and months of noise monitoring made no difference. Councillor Gregory Smith received a plea for help and decided to invite all the parties to a round table meeting. The owner of the company, Mobile LLP attended the meeting and was sympathetic and accommodating. A range of reasonable measures were agreed that wouldn't interfere with the business but that would make a great difference to the residents. Good news all round.

Do you have something that needs mending?

Councillor Gregory Smith says "try having it repaired before you buy a new item". Haddenham Repair Café started up in November at the Village Hall. It will be open monthly, the next will be on the 5th February 9 am to 12. You can bring your broken item and one of the volunteers will see if it can be fixed. Many repairs can be done on the spot or advice can be given on how to mend them. In addition, refreshments are available while you wait. What more can you ask?
