20 MPH SPEED LIMIT FOR BRILL?



The Green Party is working with communities across Bucks to address the problems of road safety and preserving the character of our wonderful communities. We recently spoke to residents in Brill where a survey identified speeding cars as a significant problem. Residents in other villages have raised the same issue.

Brill Green Campaigner, Paul Norman, says that traffic calming measures and 20 mph speed limits would make the village an even better place to live and he will be campaigning to make this a reality. Paul says "The problem is that with so much on street parking, crossing the road can be quite dangerous. Wouldn't it be great if Buckinghamshire Council supported 20 mph for all the villages that want it? I hope we can make that happen."

COMMUNITY BOARD VOTES **AGAINST**FUNDING FOR COMMUNITY PUB

Bucks Council has no policy to ensure that developers put solar panels on new industrial buildings on their land. Councillor Gregory Smith is infuriated by this and is meeting the Head of Asset Management to find a sensible way forward. Gregory said "we must not waste good roof assets that can be used for energy creation".

HADDENHAM GOES BEE FRIFNDI Y



There was quite a buzz at Zero Carbon Haddenham's Bee Squared event in February. Bees and other insects are suffering a fall in their numbers due to loss of habitat and the use of pesticides. Families were able to see demonstrations from bee keepers and obtain free wildflower seeds for their own Bee Square (a metre patch in each garden to provide frequent foraging for local bees). Councillor Greg Smith, a member of the group, said "people really understand the problem and want to help make a difference. It was good to welcome residents from our new developments".

The government has made it essential that voters take **photo ID** to polling stations in order to vote. If you don't have photo ID the easiest thing is to register for a postal vote on Bucks Council website.
